PERMANENT INJUNCTION. 14 CIVIL PENALTIES, RESTITUTION, AND OTHER 15 ANGIE'S LIST, INC., a Delaware Corporation, and **EQUITABLE RELIEF** 16 DOES 1 through 100, inclusive, **Business and Professions Code Defendants** §17200 et seq. & § 17500 et seq 17 18 19 The District Attorney for the City and County of San Francisco, authorized to protect the 20 general public within the State of California from false and misleading representations and 21 unlawful business practices, brings this suit in the name of the People of the State of California. 22 23 The People hereby allege the following on information and belief: 24 PARTIES AND VENUE The authority of the District Attorney for the City and County of San Francisco to 25 1. bring this action is derived from the statutory law of the State of California, specifically Business 26 and Professions Code sections 17200 et seq. and 17500 et seq. 27

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- 3. The true names and capacities, whether individual, corporate, associate, or otherwise, of the defendants sued herein under the fictitious names of DOES 1 through 100, inclusive, are unknown to Plaintiff, who therefore sues said defendants by such fictitious names. Each fictitiously named defendant is responsible in some manner for the violations of law herein alleged. Plaintiff will amend its complaint to show the true names and capacities of such defendants, as well as the manner in which each fictitious defendant is responsible for the violations of law of Angie's List herein alleged, when these facts are ascertained.
- 4. At all relevant times, the defendants committed the acts, caused others to commit the acts, ratified the commission of the acts, or permitted others to commit the acts alleged in this complaint and has made, caused, ratified, or permitted others to make the false or misleading statements alleged in this complaint. Whenever reference is made in this complaint to any act of the defendants, such allegation shall mean that each defendant acted individually and jointly with the other defendants named in that cause of action.
- 5. Whenever in this complaint reference is made to any act of any corporate defendant, such allegation shall be deemed to mean that such corporate defendant did the acts alleged in the complaint through its officers, directors, agent, employees, and/or representatives while they were acting within the actual or ostensible scope of their authority.
- 6. Whenever in this complaint reference is made to any act of any individual defendant, such allegation shall be deemed to mean that such defendant, all times herein mentioned, was acting (a) as a principal, (b) under the express or implied agency conferred by the other defendants, and/or (c) with actual or ostensible authority to perform the acts so alleged.

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7. The defendants at all times mentioned herein have transacted business within the City and County of San Francisco and throughout the State of California. The violations of law herein described have been committed within and from the City and County of San Francisco, and elsewhere within the State of California.

8. The actions of the defendants, as hereinafter set forth, are in violation of the laws and public polices of the State of California and are inimical to the rights and interests of the general public as consumers, competitors and citizens. Unless the People are granted the remedies sought herein, including injunctive relief by order of this Court, the defendants will continue to engage in the unlawful acts and practices set forth below and will continue to cause injury and harm to the general public.


ALLEGATIONS

9. Angie's List's website tells consumers it can help them "find top-rated, certified pros for your project" (www.angieslist.com/ accessed July 6, 2018). Beginning on an unknown date that occurred on or after June 2013 and continuing within the period of the respective statutes of limitations for the claims in this lawsuit and through today, Angie's List has made a number of false and misleading representations about background checks. These representations have appeared on Angie's List's website; in television advertisements; and on the Angie's List smartphone app. They include, but are not limited to, the following statements.

False and Misleading Website Statements.

10. Beginning on an unknown date that occurred on or after June 2013 and continuing within the period of the respective statutes of limitations for the claims in this lawsuit and through today, Angie's List has made false and misleading representations on its website that are likely to deceive consumers into believing Angie's List has background-checked the people coming into their homes. This is not the case. Angie's List only background-checks the principal/owner of the businesses consumers find through Angie's List. Angie's List has made its false and misleading representations on its homepage; on a separate "how-it-works" webpage accessed from the homepage by clicking either of two hyperlinks (one in a band at the top of the homepage, and the other on the bottom of the homepage); and in a list of Frequently Asked Questions "FAQs."

11. Beginning on an unknown date that occurred on or after June 2013 and through at least October 2017, Angie's List's homepage (www.angieslist.com) represented to consumers that, "Our Angie's List Super Service award winning providers, as well as advertising companies, have been background checked." This representation appeared towards the middle of the homepage in a banner entitled, "How it Works" and immediately underneath an icon representing a law-enforcement shield and the words "Background Checks:"

12. Beginning on an unknown date that occurred on or after June 2013 and through to the present, Angie's List has also made false and misleading representations about its background checks on a separate "how-it-works" webpage (not to be confused with the "How It Works" banner on the homepage) that could be accessed from the homepage by clicking a hyperlink on the persistent green banner at the top of the homepage or by clicking a hyperlink at the bottom of that page. Through at least May 16, 2016, Angie's List's "how-it-works" webpage told consumers, "All Super Service Award winning providers, as well as all advertisers on Angie's List, have been background checked – giving you the confidence to hire right" (www.angieslist.com/how-it-works accessed May 16, 2016). This representation appeared below a banner heading entitled, "Why Choose Angie's List" and immediately underneath an icon representing a law-enforcement shield and the words "Background Checks." Starting at some time on or before June 29, 2016, Angie's List changed the wording of the misrepresentation slightly, to read, "Our Angie's List Super

A persistent banner is a banner that remains at the top of the viewer's screen when the viewer clicks through to another webpage on the site.

Service Award winning providers, as well as all advertising companies, have been background checked." The current version of the "how-it-works" webpage has the same language:



(www.angieslist.com/how-it-works.htm accessed July 3, 2018). A closeup of the Background Checks representation on the "how-it-works" webpage appears below:



above are false and misleading. They are likely to deceive consumers into believing Angie's List has background-checked the people coming into their homes. Angie's List intends for consumers who see these representations to believe that Angie's List has background-checked the people coming into their homes. This is shown by the fact that, at least through February 2017, Angie's List asked the person registering a business with Angie's List to confirm that the business's employees and contractors who service Angie's List customers had recently been background-checked, even though Angie's List did not perform any background check at all on these people, and had no way of even knowing who they were. During the business-registration process, a person registering a business with Angie's List was asked to check a box next to text stating:

"I confirm I am an employee of this business and agree to the terms of service. Lattest that I

"I confirm I am an employee of this business and agree to the terms of service. I attest that I have recently had a criminal background check run on my employees and contractors who service Angie's list members. Further, I attest that all such employees and contractors have met Angie's List's minimum criminal background check standards.

(www.business.angieslist.com/Registration/SimpleRegistration.aspx accessed February 14, 2017).

14. This business registration process occurred on a portion of the Angie's List website dedicated to business and that consumers would have no reason to visit. And even if consumers did visit the business pages of the Angie's List website, they would not have learned the truth – that Angie's List did not background-check the people coming into consumers' homes. The check-box described above did not appear until several steps into the process of registering a business with Angie's List – a process consumers would have no reason to even begin.

Misleading and Ineffective FAQ About Background Checks

15. Nothing on the Angie's List homepage or the "how-it-works" webpage corrects the misleading message that Angie's List background-checks the people coming into consumers' homes. Neither does anything on the "how-it-works" webpage. None of the four "Frequently Asked Questions" listed prominently at the bottom of the "how-it-works" webpage even discusses background checks. They are "Is Angie's List Free?", "Is Angie's List in my area?", "Which providers are on Angie's List", and "What services are reviewed on Angie's List?" A closeup of

1 these four FAQs at the bottom of the "how-it-works" webpage appears below. 2 **Frequently Asked Questions** 3 4 Is Angle's List free? Which providers are on Angle's List? 5 is Angie's List in my area? What services are reviewed on Angle's List? 6 7 (Closeup of the "Frequently Asked Questions" on www.angieslist.com/how-it-works.htm accessed 8 July 3, 2018) 9 16. Instead of putting the FAQ that discusses background checks into the prominent 10 "Frequently Asked Questions" on the "how-it-works" webpage, Angie's List buries it in a list of 11 FAQs that are on a separate webpage. This FAQ is not an effective disclaimer. Throughout 2015 12 and 2016 the FAQ reinforced the misleading impression that Angie's List had background-13 checked the people coming into consumers' homes. Moreover, the FAQ was not in proximity to 14 the misrepresentations on the homepage and "how-it-works" webpage. Finally, when Angie's List 15 did change the FAQ to even hint at the possibility that not everybody within the businesses 16 featured on Angie's List had been background-checked, it sprinkled the FAQ with confusing 17 jargon that left more questions than answers about who Angie's List actually background-checks. 18 17. A consumer viewing Angie's List's homepage got no information whatsoever about 19 background checks other than the misleading representations on the homepage that appeared 20 through October 2017. The "how-it-works" webpage contains no FAQs that discuss background 21 checks at all, much less counter the misleading representations on the webpage. A consumer 22 looking for information about background checks would not find them in the prominent 23 "Frequently Asked Questions" at the bottom of the "how-it-works" webpage. The consumer 24 would have to click a different hyperlink entitled "FAQ" to be connected to an additional menu of 25 FAQs in order to search for more information about background checks. 26 18. And, during 2015 and 2016 the consumer who went through all of these steps to search 27 for additional information about background checks, and who managed to find the FAQ entitled 28

"Does Angie's List do Background Checks on Providers" would receive a misleading message reinforcing the impression that Angie's List had background-checked the people coming into their homes. The FAQ dated November 25, 2015 told consumers:

"Angie's List has background checks performed on all "A"- and "B"-rated companies. Background checks are not performed on "C"-, "D"-, or "F"-rated companies since we've found that members tend to avoid these companies. Background checks may include financial, reputational and annual criminal checks."

- 19. In June of 2016, the People of the State of California served Angie's List with an administrative subpoena and administrative interrogatories. Both the subpoena and the interrogatories informed Angie's List that "The District Attorney of the City and County of San Francisco reasonably believes that you may have violated Business and Professions Code sections 17200 et seq. and 17500 et seq. by making misleading representations on your webpages about which personnel from Angie's List providers undergo background checks and about the comprehensiveness of the checks."
- 20. Six months after Angie's List received the People's Administrative subpoena and interrogatories, Anglie's List was continuing to use the "Does Angie's List do Background Checks on Providers" FAQ to reinforce the impression that Angie's List background-checked all of the businesses' employees who would be servicing the consumer, although Angie's List changed the wording of the FAQ slightly. The FAQ dated November 30, 2016 told consumers:

"Angie's List has background checks performed on all "A", and "B" – rated companies that have chosen to become advertisers with us. Background checks are not performed on "C" -, "D"-, or "F"-rated companies since we've found that members tend to avoid these companies. Background checks may include financial, reputational and annual criminal checks."

But Angie's List sprinkled the 4 FAQ with confusing jargon that left more questions than answers about who Angie's List actually 5 background-checks. The "Does Angie's List do Background Checks on Providers" FAQ dated 6 7 February 8, 2017 read: "Angie's List has criminal background checks performed annually on the principal/owner or 8 relevant manager of all "A"- and "B"-rated companies that are Certified Service Providers, 9 that offer ecommerce offers, that receive leads through the Projects Submissions platform, or that are granted the super Service Award." 10 (www.angieslist.com/faq/does-angies-list-do-backgorund-checks-providers/ accessed February 22, 11 2017). 12 22. In an entry dated March 16, 2018, Angie's List changed its background-check FAQ 13 slightly, but continued to use confusing jargon that obfuscated, rather than clearly explained, who 14 Angie's List actually background-checks. The FAQ now reads: 15 "Angie's List has criminal background checks performed annually on the principal/owner 16 or relevant manager of all Certified Service Providers that offer ecommerce offers, that receive leads through the Projects Submissions platform, or that are granted the Super 17 Service Award." 18 **Background Checks On Pros** 19 March 16, 2018 20 Angle's List has criminal background checks performed annually on the principal/owner or relevant manager of all Certified Service Providers that offer ecommerce offers, that receive leads through the Projects Submissions 21 platform, or that are granted the Super Service Award. Since we only perform these background checks annually, we ask anyone with knowledge of legal, ethical, or 22 financial concerns regarding a company contact us by either logging in and selecting Begin Live Chat feature or Send A Message using our contact form . Angle's List may investigate information we receive regarding a 23 company's background. 24 While we always strive to provide the most current information, we also recommend that you perform your own 25 research on the companies you hire. (www.angieslist.com/faq/background-checks-pros/ accessed June 28, 2018). 26 Neither the FAQ dated February 22, 2017 nor the FAQ dated March 16, 2018 are 23. 27 effective disclaimers to counter the misleading statements on Angie's List's homepage that were 28

made through October 2017, and on Angie's List's "how-it-works" webpage that are still made today. In addition to sprinkling the FAQ with confusing jargon, Angie's List buried the FAQ on a separate web-page with no indication at all next to the homepage's and "how-it-works" webpages' background-check representations that there are any qualifications to those representations. This placement of the FAQ violates FTC proximity guidelines for effective disclosures (.COM DISCLOSURES – HOW TO MAKE EFFECTIVE DISCLOSURES IN DIGITAL ADVERTISING, pp. 7-13 (FTC March 2013)).

24. Moreover, even if a consumer could cut through all of the jargon on the "Does Angie's List do Background Checks on Providers" FAQ dated February 22, 2017 and the FAQ dated March 16, 2018 and divine that Angie's List has not background-checked the people coming to the consumer's home, this message contradicts rather than qualifies or limits the claims made on Angie's List's homepage and "how-it-works" webpages. Therefore, under Federal Trade Commission guidance, the FAQ is not an effective disclaimer to counter the false and misleading background-check representations on Angie's List's homepage and "how-it-works" webpage. Federal Trade Commission guidance on electronic media disclosures provides:


Advertisers are responsible for ensuring that all express and implied claims that an ad conveys to reasonable consumers are truthful and substantiated. When identifying these claims, advertisers should not focus only on individual phrases or statements, but should consider the ad as a whole, including the text, product name, and depictions. If an ad makes express or implied claims that are likely to be misleading without certain qualifying information, the information must be disclosed. A disclosure can only qualify or limit a claim to avoid a misleading impression. It cannot cure a false claim. If a disclosure provides information that contradicts a material claim, the disclosure will not be sufficient to prevent the ad from being deceptive. In that situation, the claim itself must be modified.

(.COM DISCLOSURES – HOW TO MAKE EFFECTIVE DISCLOSURES IN DIGITAL ADVERTISING, p. 5 (FTC March 2013)).

False and Misleading Television Advertisements

25. Angie's List has also broadcast television advertisements with a false and misleading message regarding background checks. One such advertisement can be seen today from internet-enabled devices in the City and County of San Francisco. The advertisement features a short-order cook working in a restaurant kitchen next to a "Wanted" poster featuring his photograph. A

waiter picking up an order tells the cook, "Ya kinda look like that guy." The cook looks at his picture on the "Wanted" poster, then turns back to the waiter, and replies "nah." An announcer then says, "Annual background checks, another reason to get Angie's List for your home."



- 26. The "wanted" advertisement is false and misleading. It is clear that the purpose of the advertisement is to convince consumers that they need Angie's List for their homes because the people they will be letting into their homes when they use Angie's List will have passed annual criminal background checks.
- 27. A message appears in small print at the bottom of the "Wanted" ad that states "Only on Certified Providers and Super Service Award Winners. See website for details." This message does nothing to change the ad's false and misleading message. Moreover, Federal Trade Commission guidance and applicable case law holds that a reference in a television ad or print media to a disclaimer in another medium, such as a website, is insufficient.

False and Misleading Smartphone App Statements

28. The Angie's List app smartphone app has also repeated the false and misleading statement that "Our Angie's List Super Service award winning providers, as well as all advertising companies, have been background checked." In version 5.71 of the iOS app, the message appeared when a user followed the "How it Works" link on the "Join" screen.



(iOS app version 5.71, screencast recorded on December 30, 2016)


29. As with the website, the FAQ section of Angie's List's iOS app conveyed a misleading message reinforcing the impression that Angie's List had background-checked the people coming into their homes. Version 5.71 iOS app FAQ repeated the entry dated Nov 30, 2016 from the

website:

"Angie's List has background checks performed on all "A", and "B" – rated companies that have chosen to become advertisers with us.

Background checks are not performed on "C" -, "D"-, or "F"-rated companies since we've found that members tend to avoid these companies.

Background checks may include financial, reputational and annual criminal checks."



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TOLLING OF STATUTES OF LIMITATIONS

30. The People have entered into a series of agreements with Defendant Angie's List, Inc. to toll any applicable Statute of Limitations. As a result of these agreements, the period of time from October 16, 2017 through July 5, 2018, inclusive ("Tolling Period"), will not be included in computing the time limited by any Statute of Limitation under the causes of actions that may arise out of claims covered by the tolling agreement. These claims include the claims that are brought in this matter.

FIRST CAUSE OF ACTION

Business & Professions Code, § 17500, et seq.

(Untrue or Misleading Statements Against All Defendants)

- 31. Plaintiff, the People of the State of California, restates and incorporates paragraphs 1 through 30 as though fully set forth herein.
- 32. Beginning at an exact date unknown to The People of the State of California, but in any event within three years of the filing of this complaint (plus additional time set forth in tolling agreements), and continuing to the present, the defendants, with the intent to perform services, or to induce members of the public to enter into obligations relation thereto, made or disseminated or cause to be made or disseminated before the public in the State of California statements concerning such services, or other matters of fact connected with the performance thereof, which were untrue or misleading, and which the defendants knew or reasonably should have known were untrue or misleading and likely to deceive members of the public, in violation of Business and Professions Code section 17500 *et seq*. Such statements include but are not limited to all of the representations set forth and discussed in paragraphs 9 through 29, inclusive.

SECOND CAUSE OF ACTION

Business & Professions Code, § 17200, et seq.

(Unfair Competition and Unlawful Business Practices Against All Defendants)

33. Plaintiff, the People of the State of California, restates and incorporates paragraphs 1 through 32 as though fully set forth herein.

34. Beginning at an exact date unknown to The People of the State of California, but in any event within four years of the filing of this complaint (plus additional time set forth in tolling agreements), and continuing to the present, the defendants engaged in and continue to engage in acts of unfair competition and in unfair, deceptive or unlawful business practices within the meaning of Business and Professions Code section 17200, et seq., by engaging in the unlawful business practices set forth in this complaint.

PRAYER FOR RELIEF

WHEREFORE, The People of the State of California pray for judgment as follows:

- 1. That pursuant to Business and Professions Code sections 17203 and 17535, and the Court's inherent equitable powers, the defendants; their successors and the assigns of all or substantially all their assets; their directors, officers, employees, agents, independent contractors, partners, associates and representatives of each of them; and all persons, corporations and other entities acting in concert or in participation with the defendants, be permanently restrained and enjoined from:
- a. Making, disseminating, or causing to be made or disseminated, any misleading, false or deceptive statements in violation of section 17500 of the Business and Professions Code, including, but not limited to, the false or misleading statements alleged in the First Cause of Action of this complaint; and
- b. Engaging in any acts of unfair competition, in violation of section 17200 of the Business and Professions Code, including but not limited to the unlawful business acts and practices alleged in the Second Cause of Action of this complaint.
- 2. That pursuant to Business and Professions Code section 17536, The defendants be ordered to pay a civil penalty of Two Thousand Five Hundred Dollars (\$2,500.00) for each violation of Business and Profession Code section 17500, according to proof.
- 3. That pursuant to Business and Professions Code section 17206, The defendants be ordered to pay a civil penalty of Two Thousand Five Hundred Dollars (\$2,500.00) for each violation of Business and Profession Code section 17200, according to proof.

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- 4. That pursuant to Business and Professions Code sections 17535 and 17203, and pursuant to the Court's inherent equitable power, the defendants be ordered to restore to every person in interest all money and property which was acquired by the defendants through their unlawful conduct, according to proof.
 - 5. That The People of the State of California be awarded their costs of suit.
- 6. That The People of the State of California be given such other and further relief as the nature of this case may require and this Court deems proper to fully and successfully dissipate the effect of the unlawful business practices and false or misleading representations contained herein.
