- 1. Nearly All Candidates Have Room To Grow—Biden, Sanders, and Warren are the most known candidates. All others are known by fewer than 8 in 10 voters.
- 2. Voters Aren't Moving Their Support Although three potential candidates announced they would not be running and two candidates officially declared this past week, there has been little movement.
- **3. Trump Most Popular in Alabama, Least Popular in Vermont:** The latest state-by-state approval tracking numbers show how the President's approval has shifted since taking office.



This week's report features surveys with registered voters conducted from March 4, 2019 to March 10, 2019. The interviews were conducted online and the data were weighted to approximate a target sample of registered voters based on age, race/ethnicity, gender, educational attainment, and region.

Which Candidates Have Momentum in Early Primary States?

We have included an 'Early Primary States' demographic throughout this report to showcase who has momentum going into the primary elections. The numbers reflect voters who live in Iowa, New Hampshire, South Carolina, and Nevada.

About our Democratic Primary Results

Our Democratic Primary results are reported using 15,226 interviews with registered voters who indicate they may vote in the Democratic primary or caucus. For those who say don't know or no opinion, they are asked to pick a candidate they are learning towards, which are factored into the results. The margin of error for potential Democratic primary voters is +/- 1%.

About our Republican Primary Results


Our Republican Primary results are reported using 13, 682 interviews with registered voters who indicate they may vote in a Republican primary or caucus. The margin of error for potential Republican primary voters is +/- 1%.


Who is leading among Democratic primary voters nationwide, among key coalitions, and in early primary states.

WHO'S LEADING THE DEMOCRATIC PRIMARY / ALL DEMOCRATIC PRIMARY VOTERS






WHO'S LEADING THE DEMOCRATIC PRIMARY / EARLY PRIMARY STATES





This map displays Trump's net approval (approval minus disapproval) in all 50 states.


He is most popular in:
