7. Other financial circumstances of which I would like the court to be aware:

Plaintiff is a 501(c)(3) nonprofit foundation. The bank balance of \$7,649.44 is misleading because \$7,000 is grant money received to fund a Civil War reenactment in October of 2019 that will be free to the public in Nebraska City. Because the \$7,000 was a grant, it cannot be used for any of purpose than paying for reenactment expenses. As a result, the Mayhew Cabin Foundation has a total of \$649.44 as of June 18, 2019. The foundation does own real estate located at 2012 4th Corso in Nebraska City. It is a museum property with historic structures and a museum building. The museum building is not considered to have any value as it is structurally unsound and water damaged. The site is zoned for commercial uses. However, any value to the site would be offset by the cost to raze the unsound museum building.

8. I believe my living expenses wholly absorb my income, and I have no assets that can be liquidated.

Plaintiff Mayhew Cabin Foundation brings forth the following causes of action and alleges the following:

- Plaintiff is a 501(c)(3) nonprofit foundation. The museum is located at 2012 1. 4th Corso in Nebraska City and operates as Mayhew Cabin with John Brown's Cave Museum. The museum interprets the history of the Underground Railroad in Nebraska. The museum site includes historic structures that are on the national register of historic places. The museum site is recognized by the National Park Service's Network to Freedom.
  - Defendant is the City of Nebraska City. 2.
- Defendant has been directing surface and sewer waters via artificial means 3. (storm sewer inlets) onto the north edge of the Plaintiff's property in an unreasonable and irresponsible manner for city surface water drainage resulting in severe erosion to the site and systematic structural damage to an historic structure, and damage to other historic structures.
- Defendant is directing surface water from Defendant's property located 4. adjacent to the east of Plaintiff's property into a ravine located on Plaintiff's property in an unreasonable and negligent manner and in violation of the law.
- Defendant installed two drainage tubes extending from Defendant's property 5. located adjacent to the east that are directed into the north portion of the ravine on Plaintiff's property in an unreasonable, irresponsible, and negligent manner. This drainage, in addition to that listed in numbers 3 and 4 above, have resulted in severe erosion to the site, systematic damage to an historic structure, and damage to other historic structures.

6. Defendant has acted in a negligent manner by failing to maintain and keep clear a drainage tube located on Plaintiff's property that is part of Defendant's drainage system. This failure resulted in severe flooding and erosion. The damaging flooding events occurred approximately four to five times, particularly noted over Memorial Day Weekend of 2019 (May 28, 2019 – water receded several days later), from June 3, 2019 to approximately June 5, 2019, and from June 18, 2019 to June 24, 2019. As a result of these flooding events, Plaintiff's property suffered extensive erosion, vegetation die-off, destruction of a walkway and handrail, and structural damage to historic structures. Due to damage, the overall museum site has been closed since May 28, 2019 cutting off the museum's revenue source. Erosion to the ravine has caused a live large tree to fall onto Plaintiff's museum grounds and damaged the electrical connection to another historic structure.

7. Continual, iterative, and forceful hydraulic action of Defendant's surface and sewer water draining onto Plaintiff's site from multiple sources and washing out of the existing earth, sediments, and vegetation into the ravine and out through the piped remainder of Defendant's sewer system, have caused erosion over the years, has resulted in subsidence of the south portion of Plaintiff's property toward the ravine area, and caused unknown amounts of Plaintiff's foundational earth to be washed into Defendant's drainage system to the south. The shifting of the ground has caused Plaintiff's museum building to sink northeasterly to the extent that the building is structurally unsound.

## **COUNT 1 – NEGLIGENCE**

Defendant has acted in a negligent and unreasonable manner by draining surface water from approximately 17 acres of city property and piped water directly onto Plaintiff's property along the north.

Defendant has further acted in a negligent and unreasonable manner by draining directly onto Plaintiff's property from two additional drainage tubes along the east of Plaintiff's property and by grading Defendant's property so as to drain surface water down Plaintiff's ravine embankment in violation of the law.

Defendant failed to maintain and keep clear a drainage tube that is part of Defendant's drainage system, and to properly rock the ravine slopes or to construct a piped drainage system. These failures resulted in serious damage to Plaintiff's site and historic structures.

Defendant has an implied easement on Plaintiff's property and has failed to formally file said easement in order to maintain ravine on Plaintiff's property as part of Defendant's drainage system by properly taking erosion prevention measures.

Long-term negligence has resulted in severe injury to Plaintiff's property by erosion of the site and systematic damage to an historic structure.

## **DAMAGES**

Wherefore, Plaintiff seeks compensatory damages in the amount of \$4,449,300 for the following:

Construction of new museum building: \$447,000

Razing of current museum building: \$50,000

Repairs to tunnel exit and new walkway/handrail: \$443,000

Erosion remediation to site: \$500,000

Loss of income for the 2019 and 2020 season: \$6,300

Removal of fallen ravine tree: \$3,000

Punitive damages: \$3,000,000

Plaintiff further requests Defendant to construct a new drainage tube at Defendant's sole cost on city property adjacent to the east of Plaintiff's property (or elsewhere) in order to divert all water currently draining onto Plaintiff's property to the proposed tube, whatever its determined location, in order to prevent future damage to Plaintiff's property.

Lastly, Plaintiff requests Defendant to pay for any and all fees and costs for a structural engineer to advise Plaintiff on structural soundness (or lack thereof) of Plaintiff's damaged historic structures, including tunnel, cross-wings, and cabin cellar. Further, should it be discovered that repairs need to be made to the cellar, cross-wings, and/or tunnel, any and all repairs should be paid by Defendant.
